Based on the request and the reference documents noted, it would appear that the ATIP requester may be confusing the role and operations of the National Forensic Laboratory Services with the National DNA Data Bank (NDDB). The reference to the Public Safety Minister's response to Order Paper Question Q -53 on January 17, 2005 relates to operational forensic casework backlogs and the National Forensic Laboratory Services and does not involve the NDDB.

Convicted Offender Samples Received (Table 1):



The NDDB does not have an operational backlog. It receives between 500 and 700 convicted offender samples on a weekly basis. All eligible convicted offender samples are processed by the NDDB within 14 days of receipt. In order to achieve an effective cost efficient processing system, a 14 day processing cycle is used to ensure that full sample plates composed of 84 samples each, can be processed simultaneously using an automated system. Urgent samples can be specifically selected and processed within 24-48 hours if the NDDB is notified in advance. In order to clarify the processing schedule, the following information is provided. As noted in Table 1, 66 convicted offender samples were received on February 28, 2017 and 125 samples on February 29, 2016. Given that February 28, 2016 was a Sunday, February 29, 2016 was chosen as it includes a summary of the hits received. Unless notified in advance that there was an urgent request to process specific samples, all 66 samples received on February 28, 2017 and all 125 samples received on February 29, 2016 were processed within 14 days of receipt. The specific dispositions of the designated offences for these convicted samples are noted in Table 1.

NDDB Hits Service Requests (Table 2):

The NDDB processes all offender and forensic hit notifications on the same day they are made by the NDDB. The attached Table 2 indicates the number of DNA offender hits and forensic hits made on February 29, 2016 and on February 28, 2017. Specifically all forensic and offender hits made on February 28, 2017 and Feb ruary 29, 2017 were processed and the notifications made without delay, on the same day.

The NDDB reports a combined summary of investigations assisted on a bimonthly basis and does not track each of the specific cases assisted on a daily basis since the nature and status of such assistance may change as an investigation matures. This information is available through the Statistics for the National DNA Data Bank website referenced by the requester. To address the request for statistics as of February 28, 2017, please find the information that was posted for that date attached.
